This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Hamstreet Primary Academy, the children have a weekly music lesson which can range from 30 minutes to an hour in total.

Our school uses the Charanga Scheme to deliver National Curriculum music and the staff have had recent training to make effective use and implement and teach its new Model Music Curriculum alongside the Original Scheme.

In Year 5, the children are given the opportunity to learn a musical instrument through the Music Plus provided by Kent Music. This has been a fantastic opportunity for the children to learn a classical instrument and the children are given the opportunity to continue tuition if they wish. The Year 5 children also celebrate with an annual concert to their families in Term 6.

At Hamstreet Primary Academy, there are peripatetic lessons from Kent Music Service and private teachers currently in the following instruments: Voice, piano, ukulele, guitar, drums and violin. These are funded by the parents and financial support is also provided for Pupil Premium children or disadvantaged children for individual or group lessons.

Hamstreet Academy work in close partnership with Kent Music and our hub leader for the Ashford District– Lucy Duff who provides support and regularly provides updates for instrumental tuition and ensemble opportunities across the local area both in term time and during the holidays.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Peripatetic Staff currently offer the following in one to one & small group tuition during the school day:

- Ukulele
- Voice
- Guitar
- Percussion
- Music Therapy
- Piano (Private Tutor)
- Drums
- Piano- KMS

Children can also join the choir which, from September will be taught after school.

There are also opportunities for Hamstreet to join up with local secondary schools for Music Celebration Days across the academic year.

Children are able to loan instruments through the school or through KMS so that music making can continue outside of school hours and during the holidays.

Hamstreet has a dedicated music room with a piano, electronic drum kit, a set of ukuleles, guitars, various woodwind, boomwhackers, percussion trolley and untuned/tuned percussion to support both curriculum music and peripatetic lessons.

For the Academic Year 23-24, several children accessed music lessons funded by Pupil Premium.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Hamstreet Primary Academy is very proud of our talented children and we regularly provide opportunities to sing and perform across the Academic year.

These include:

- Young Voices Concert – KS2
- Annual Music Concert in July for both instrumentalists and the School Choir
- Weekly Singing Assembly led by a music specialist.
- Choir performing in School at various events across the school calendar
- Year 5 Violin Concert to celebrate their learning through Music Plus from KMS learning across the year.
- Nativity – EYFS & KS1
- Annual Production for Years 3 & 4 in Term 4

- Annual Production for Years 5 & 6 in Term 6.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

In the next year 2024-2025, we are planning to continue to raise the profile of music and provide even more opportunities for performing both inside and outside of our Academy.

These include:

- Performing in our local community
- KS1 learning the ukulele supported by KMS & Music Digital Plus.
- Classes performing in assemblies to celebrate their curriculum music through the Charanga Scheme of Work.
- More PP children/disadvantaged children having fully funded music lessons whether through subsidised funding through KMS.
